

1. Annual Fire Inspections – Final Results


The focus of the annual fire break inspection program has been properties in high bushfire prone areas. The following is a graphical representation of the inspections for the year.





2. Yallingup Parking Review

Last meeting the committee was advised of proposed parking controls in Yallingup Townsite as a means of improving access for emergency services vehicles during an emergency. At its meeting on 10 May 2017 Council approved no stopping on the western side of Elsegood Avenue, Hammond Road, and Wardanup Crescent from Dawson Drive to the Public Access Way.



3. Fireworks on Private Property

At its meeting in December 2016 the committee discussed the conduct of fireworks events for private events during the prohibited and restricted burning season. As a result of this discussion the City has drafted an Operational Procedure with which to assess requests for these events.

Under the draft procedure (which is subject to our internal approvals process) fireworks will not be permitted:

- a. unless the application has been submitted through the Department of Mines and Petroleum (Resource Safety);
- b. during prohibited or restricted burning times; and
- c. Where the fireworks display is proposed to be held outside the preferred hours of 8am to 9pm Sunday to Thursday, 8am to 10pm Friday and Saturday.

4. Election of new Chair

To align the BFAC with other council committees the election of the new chair will be postponed until after the local government election. There is nothing in the *Bush Fires Act 1954* or the terms of reference for the committee that stipulates when the election will be held or the term of office.

The Terms of Reference will be reviewed and presented to BFAC in September. It include setting the election of the new chair at the first meeting following the Council election and will recommend the term of office be two years.

Matters to be discussed:

eAcademy

 On 22nd May, all Brigade FCO's, Captains and Secretaries were emailed a proposal from Regional Training Coordinator Donna Virgo asking for feedback from Brigades about a revised eAcademy procedure which would see the transition from new member to initial training pathways smoother and quicker. All those Brigades that replied have unanimously endorsed the idea.

The proposal is that the Admin team manually enter the volunteer onto LSW VFF1 pathway once they receive a volunteer ID number. We will also need to make sure that all membership forms have an email as this is the mode of communication for the eAcademy. We believe this improvement will introduce our new volunteers to a simpler, more inviting process. Once the membership is confirmed we will be sending volunteers an email and steps on how to register for the portal and access the eAcademy, so they can access courses quicker and easier. This will save time with 1:1 individual contact which we are doing now which is not sustainable.

Those Brigades that haven't responded should email their approval to manjmiup.reception@dfes.wa.gov.au (and copy to Peter Stark) that the brigade/LGA are happy for this to occur.

 A further reminder that everyone who applies for a course must select their Brigade officer as their supervisor – not DO Danny Mosconi! The eAcademy will be changing the drop down box order so that this should be more logical. In the interim, please advise your Brigade training officers that they should train members on how to do this.

Training

- The previously reported Training Manual for City of Busselton Bushfire Fighters is under way.
 Collaboration between the Shires of Augusta Margaret River and Nannup will see each LGA follow a similar format and resources. This project will be ongoing and will hopefully pick up pace as a new CESM takes the chair!
- The Introduction to Firefighting and Bushfire Fighting courses scheduled for April/May were
 cancelled due to a lack of numbers. Brigade secretaries were asked to post ask new
 members for expressions of interest in participating in this courses. If we get sufficient
 numbers, we will run them prior to the next scheduled ones in spring.
- The midweek Introduction to Structural Firefighting was run on Tuesday 6th June with 7 participants from across the region. As a result, some other courses will also be offered midweek later in the year.

Security alarms at fire stations

• The installation at the first 7 brigade sheds is now complete and it is pleasing to see that there have been no further break ins since. Funding has been approved for the installation in a further five brigades in the new financial year.

• I have a number of Alarm stickers available tonight if any Brigades without fitted alarms would like to take them to fix to prominent areas of the sheds in the interim.

Updated brigade records

• Thanks to the brigades who sent in the updates of brigades some months ago. I will resend out records to all please review and update current membership and delete old or non-active members etc.

Membership Application Forms

 A number of Brigades are using the old style membership applications which does not require an email address or Next of Kin notification. All existing membership registration forms and books are to be discarded and all new applications should be done using the form available from the Volunteer Portal (under the BFB logo > Administration Forms). Any older forms will not be processed.

Operational Circulars

- Vertex handheld radios are designed for short distance communications and may not have
 the power to trigger a repeater. Operational Circular 40-2017 states htat they can only be
 used as a backup on duplex channels (e.g. Ch. 182) and then only with approval from the
 Incident Controller and after radio checks to ensure they are capable in the specific
 terrain/conditions of being reliable in that situation.
- Operational Circular 39-2017 reinforces some basic information about the use of selcall.
 Crews that use selcall should register for a WAERN course (4.5 hours for both Basic and Advanced) to ensure the understand the limitations etc.

Volunteer Portal Upgrades

• The volunteer portal has received a number of upgrades and updates in recent weeks which makes navigation and use much simpler.

Thanks for patience

The transition to a new CESM is taking a little longer than perhaps we would have liked and
this has resulted in a backlog of some tasks. Thanks to everyone for your patience during this
period. Be assured that all tasks are prioritised weekly and dealt with until the shiny new
CESM catches up.

USE OF SELECTIVE CALLING (SELCALL) ON WAERN RADIOS

The Selective Calling (Selcall) feature on both VHF Mid and High Band radios provides the ability to send an alert to another radio. Where vehicles are fitted with both VHF Mid and High Band radios there could be potential confusion associated with Selcall operation due to different Selcall numbering protocols.

VHF Mid Band radios use a FIVE (5) digit Selcall number and VHF High Band radios use a SIX (6) digit Selcall number. Radios must also be on the <u>same channel and band</u> to enable Selcall communications.

High Band Protocols

Where a five (5) digit Selcall number is displayed, a zero (0) must be inserted between the third and fourth digit to create a six (6) digit Selcall number for use on High Band radios e.g. Selcall # 12456 is converted to 124056 to create a six digit Selcall number.

This also applies to a five (5) digit Selcall number where there is a gap after the third digit e.g. Selcall # 124 56 is converted 124056 to create a six digit Selcall number.

Mid Band Protocols

There is no requirement to insert any zeros between the five (5) digits.

Selcall numbers could be displayed in the following locations:

- Door of the vehicle
- Bonnet of the vehicle
- Roof of the vehicle and
- Radio screen immediately after it is turned on.

Radio operators must make themselves familiar with the vehicle radio Selcall numbers and also be aware of the correct Selcall numbering protocol for the type of radio that is being used.

The FES Academy is currently reviewing the WAERN TRK Basic and Advanced User Manual and will update the manual to reflect this additional information.

USE OF VHF HANDHELD RADIOS WITH REPEATER CHANNEL

The Vertex Standard VHF High Band handheld radio was introduced to enable firefighting crews to monitor VHF High Band radio communications when working away from a vehicle.

Safety Circular 03/2014 - Use of VHF Hand Held Radios stated;

"Handheld VHF High Band radios are only to be used for communications on simplex sector channels over short distances" and:

"The use of VHF handheld radios for other than simplex communications is to cease immediately".

Safety Circular 03/2014 is to be rescinded and replaced with this Operational Circular.

Repeater (duplex) channels are primarily used for Incident Command channels and the primary means of communicating with repeaters on VHF is to be the vehicle mounted radios. This ensures maximum signal strength and range, enabling the efficient transmission of information in a timely manner.

Handheld VHF radios are a resource that should be used at the appropriate time and situation at the discretion and direction of the Incident Controller – regardless of the type of incident or hazard. The use of a handheld radio for this type of communications is limited by a number of factors. All users of the handheld VHF radios are to be aware of the following:

- The portable handheld power output is 5 watt compared to 25 watt of the vehicle mounted radio.
- The VHF portable handheld to be used effectively, is required to be in open area and not shielded by obstacles
- 3. Ensure the appropriate repeater is selected.

VHF and UHF handheld radios are able to be used as a backup for repeater (duplex) communication if the Incident Controller has approved its use and the operator has conducted radio checks with the handheld radio to confirm its signal strength and quality.

At an incident the primary means of communication through a VHF or UHF repeater (duplex) is to be from a vehicle mounted radio to maximise radio working distances. VHF and UHF handheld radios are only to be used as an alternate means of repeater (duplex) communications if the Incident Controller authorises its use at their discretion.

Personnel are reminded of the importance of detailed Incident Communications Plans.

The use of VHF handheld radios for simplex communications is to remain as per existing SOP's.

USE OF CAB MOUNTED HANDHELD SPOTLIGHTS

Incidents have been reported where the cab mounted handheld spotlights have caused heat damage to cabin equipment. These incidents have occurred where the lights have been left on and either not returned to their storage post, or have been knocked off their storage post as the vehicle is exited.

These spotlights have two operating switches: a trigger switch and a rocker switch. The trigger switch will only enable the light to operate when it is held in place. This switch is the preferred use to prevent unattended operation of the spotlight.



We again have held four meetings for the year and this system is working well enough for our needs. It gives us the communication between DFES, The City of Busselton and Emergency Services and all the Fire Agencies. This gives us an avenue to have the opportunity to feed back to these bodies concerns any ideas we have that may make our jobs easier and more effective. While there is nothing broken in our system , there is always things that can be tweaked to make it better for everyone.

I have continued to represent us at the Regional Advisory Committee (ROAC) meetings. These are held 3 times a year. I am the Chairperson for this committee.

Following the Esperance and Yarloop fires there has been discussion about whether we should have only one fire authority or should brigades be under DFES or their local government control. The investigation held after the Yarloop fire by Euen Ferguson found issues needed to be dealt with. One major point was the formation of a Rural Fire Service. With a change of Government this has now I believe has been .put on hold.

Training is ongoing and registration for training has to be made through the eAcademy. This is through the volunteer portal. Please continue to ensure members register and make yourself and brigade members familiar with how this functions.

This year we had a reasonably quiet year on the fire front. We had no Major incidents in our patch. We assisted Donnybrook/Capel with an incident.

We have worked along side Fire and Rescue and DEPAW to control all fires in the City of Busselton. This arrangement between the agencies is working very effectively. We manage to contain the fires quickly and efficiently in our area.

The issue of when to open the season is a contentious topic. We have a large area in the City of Busselton and while one area has rain other areas are dry. We have people who are not as responsible as we would like, and when fires are allowed they lose them and then we are called out to sort the problem out. I continue to wonder "why are people hesitant getting a permit to burn," It costs them no more than a few phone calls and a bit of organization.

Like last year I would like to say "Thank goodness for the assistance or aerial support". It is a life saver and a wonderful tool to have at our finger tips.

This year we have lost Tim Wall as our CESM and Peter Stark filled in while Tim was away in Albany. Once Tim returned and resigned Peter Stark has stepped into one day a week roll. I would like to thank Peter for doing this. Hopefully a new CESM will be appointed soon.

Andrew Hunt has resigned as FCO of Dunsborough and is in Geraldton with DFES working.

Barton Hatherly has stepped down as FCO of Dunsborough after a long period as FCO and I would like to thank Barton for his many years of service in this role

I would like to thank both Tim and Andrew for their support over their time involved with Busselton Bush Fire .

Please thank all of your brigade members and your families for allowing you to be the fire fighters you are, giving your time so freely.

Matters to be discussed:

• Staffing changes across Lower South West DFES:

- Area Officer Andrew Wright promoted to DO Emergency Management in SW Region (Bunbury);
- Area Officer Leeuwin Andy Thompson will take on Area Officer Geographe portfolio this will include the five "traditional VFRS in LSW (Augusta/Margaret River/Dunsborough/Busselton/Nannup);
- Nathan Hall promoted to Area Officer Leeuwin this portfolio will include the VFRS brigades at Dual Registered Brigades (Witchcliffe/Wallcliffe/Cowaramup/Yallingup Rural). Nathan will also be the representative for DFES at LEMC
- The above changes took effect on the 29th May.
- Busselton CESM Tim Wall has also been successful in obtaining an Area Officer position in Albany. The process to appoint for that position is underway.
- The 4th May was International Firefighter's day, a day to remember fallen firefighters and also recognise current serving firefighters. A memorial service was held at Busselton VFRS station and was well attended. This will become an annual event;
- On the 13th June, we will attend a familiarisation visit at the Busselton Airport to view a VARA Fokker 100. The visit is targeted at any emergency services personnel who could be deployed to BMRA in the event of an aircraft emergency. Key DFES staff and volunteers will attend.
- On the 17th June, DFES staff and volunteers will be involved in the BRMA Emergency Field Exercise.
- The Department of Fire and Emergency Services is preparing to launch its annual WinterSAFE campaign, which urges the community to stay safe from the hazards of winter storms and home fires. This year's campaign is focusing on members of our community who have been affected by storms and home fires in recent years, bringing their stories and lessons learned to the attention of others.
- More than 1,000 operational vehicles and 300 portable units now have AVL capability. The AVL system provides real-time visibility of operational vehicles with automated features that enhance crew safety.

Monthly testing is required for all AVL equipped operational vehicles and portable AVL units to:

- Confirm that the AVL equipment is functioning correctly;
- Confirm that the connection to the AVL server is functioning correctly;
- Provide an opportunity for Pinpoint software updates (including fixes and enhancements) to be received;
- Proactively identify faults; and
- Address feedback from AVL users who suggested regular tests.
- The nominations for the annual Volunteer Employer Recognition Awards (VERA) are now open. The
 awards recognise the significant role employers and self-employed volunteers play in the delivery of
 emergency services in Western Australia.

Many employers allow our emergency services volunteers to take time off work to respond to incidents or attend training, enabling them to deliver the essential services that keep our communities safe.

Without their support, our emergency services volunteers would find it difficult to uphold their commitments as volunteers and our internationally accredited VERA program is a way to acknowledge their support.

If you know of an employer or self-employed volunteer who should be recognised for their contribution then go to the Volunteer Portal and nominate now.

Dunsborough VFRS will soon receive a new firefighting appliance (Country Pumper). The new truck is
the first of its kind and will improve the capability of the Dunsborough VFRS when attending a variety
of emergencies.
